<p>Thursday</p>	<p>Edible finger paint sensory play</p>  	<p>This is the recipe:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2 cups of corn flour • 1 cup of cold water • 4.5 cups of boiling water • Liquid food colouring <p>Method: Get your child to help you measure out the ingredients then mix the cornflour with the cold water and stir together. Get the grown up to pour in the boiling water and stir. It goes really strange but keep stirring and it literally seems to "melt" into a wonderful, custard-like consistency. Then separated it into individual cups before adding colouring, but you can do it however you like and this is the stage to add colour. You could also make another edible paint by using milk and pudding powder mixes (Angel delight strawberry or chocolate). Just whisk until it turns thick. 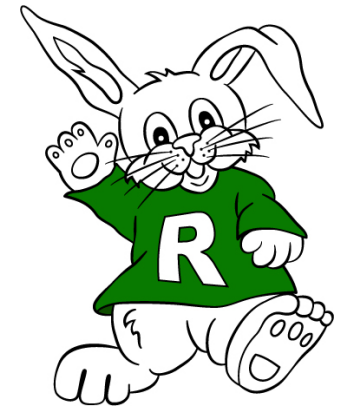
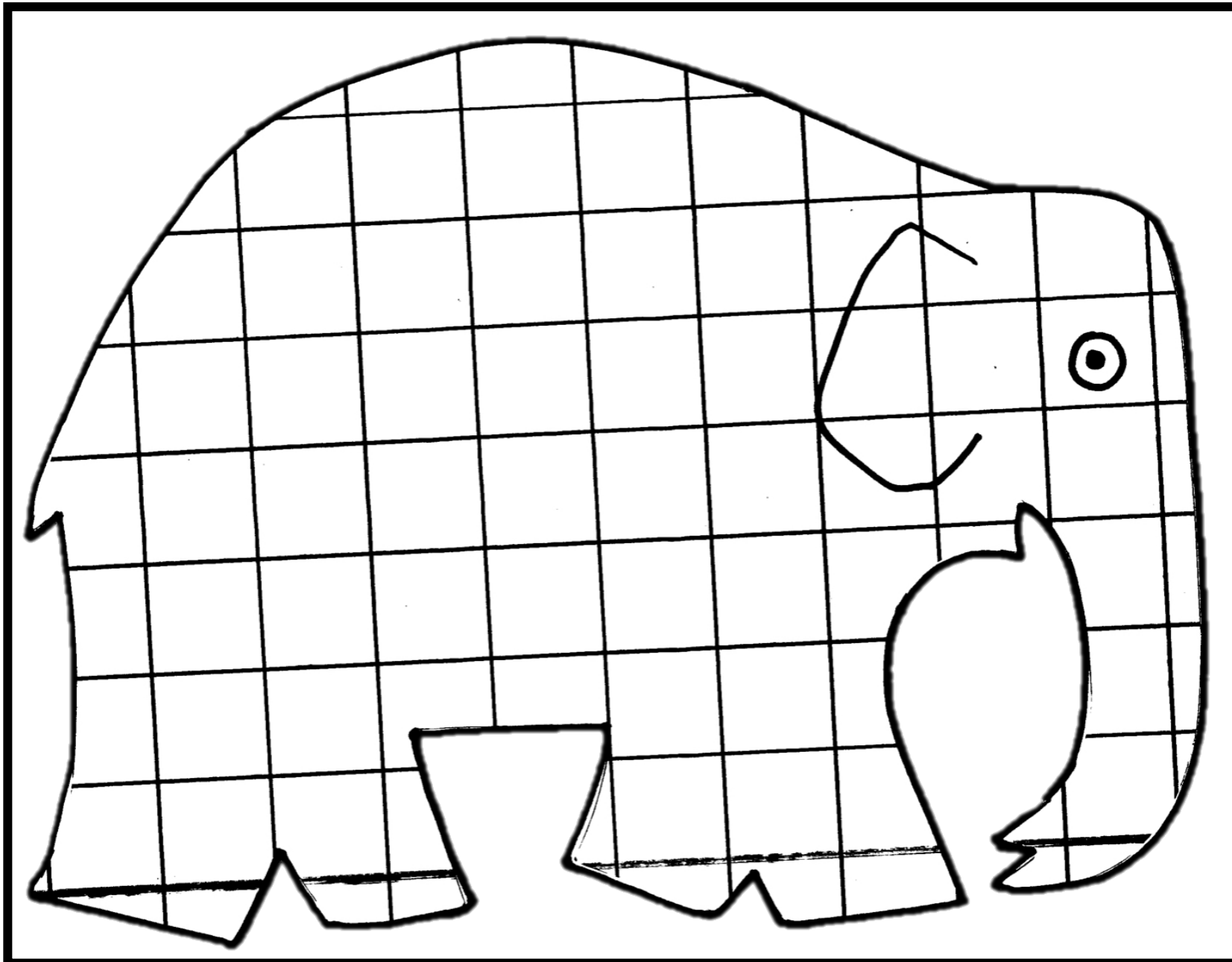
Rainbow Bread-For something a little extra fun, you could have a go at rainbow toast. It's very simple and super yummy!
What you need: Milk, Food colouring, bread, paintbrush and a toaster or grill. Then decide how you would like to top it, I love mine with butter.
What to do:Add several drops of food colouring to milk and stir. You can mix red and yellow to make orange and blue and red to make purple. Once you have made your paint, grab your paintbrush and get painting. (Not too much though you don't want your bread to be too soggy) once you are happy with your creation get a grown up to place it in the toaster or under the grill. Once its ready, top with your favourite topping and enjoy.



Toilet roll painting - collect your empty toilet roll tubes, a pair of scissors and a variety of paint colours. Cut down your rolls to $\frac{3}{4}$ of the way down several times. Once finish bend the ends slightly and then dip your rolls in the paint and begin to explore with your printed patterns. (This is a great opportunity to talk about safety when using the scissors and how to handle tools and equipment with care).
You can also cut your toilet rolls into curve petals or other shapes.
